Alpines, Past, Present and Future

Our speaker for February will be Amy Smethurst who is the Alpine Horticulturist at RHS Harlow Carr.



Amy has been the Alpine Horticulturist at Harlow Carr for 12 years and for the last 8 years has been in charge of the Alpine House.

Many of you will be familiar with the wonderful range of plants grown in the Alpine House at Harlow Carr so this will be a great opportunity to hear Amy talking about the range, variety and cultivation of alpines in the past, the present and the future. Amy

will be illustrating her talk with examples from the Alpine House.

February's Plant of the Month: White Forsythia: Abeliophyllum Distichum

This delightfully scented deciduous shrub is related to the forsythia but differs in that it has white (rather than yellow) flowers that open in early spring before true forsythia. It is a member of the olive family (Oleaceae). In February or early March, before the new leaves form, purplish buds all along the grey naked branches



open into small, white, four-petaled, almond-scented flowers with yellow stamens. It is named for a British surgeon and naturalist, Clarke Abel (1780-1826)

White forsythia is native to a small area of central Korea. It is seriously endangered in the wild, as it is regarded as a medicinal plant with properties similar to witch hazel and is illegally harvested for the black market trade in Korea. However, as it is also widely grown as a cultivated garden plant, there is no risk of extinction other than in the wild.

White forsythia likes full sun but will tolerate some shade. It is not fussy about soil conditions but will do poorly in drought- like conditions. In the coldest

areas, it is best to either protect the plant from desiccating winter winds or grow it close to a wall for extra warmth. Cut its branches and bring inside in early spring to enjoy its sweet scent. **Where to buy**: Bluebell Arboretum and Nursery Ashby de la Zouch LE65 2TA.
