Planting for Bees. The speaker for October will be Elaine Robinson





Elaine will be talking about how to choose plants for your garden that are best for bees. Elaine is a keen gardener and beekeeper and as well as sharing interesting facts about honeybees, she will also introduce us to major honeybee plants, as well as giving advice

on the best plants to grow in our gardens. Elaine will end the session with a honey tasting and the opportunity to buy her honey, beeswax wraps and wildflower seed collected from her meadow.

Fritillaria persica: Plant of the month



This month's plant, Fritillaria persica is a spring flowering bulb known as the Persian lily and is a Middle Eastern species of the lily family Liliaceae. It is native to the rocky slopes of Turkey, Iran, Iraq, Lebanon, Syria, Cyprus, Palestine and Israel. Fritillaria persica is at its very best in late-spring and early-summer. Fritillaria persica 'Minaret' produces densely-packed clusters of sumptuous, dark plum-coloured bell-

shaped flowers on elegant, tall stems which progressively open from the bottom upwards. It's unusually tall for a spring-flowering bulb and therefore makes a grand statement among other tall-flowering blooms such as tulips and white narcissi and grasses. Fritillaria persica 'Twin Towers Tribute' flowers more reliably than the species and bears two flower spikes per bulb, rather than one. The ancestors of this Fritillaria originated in southern Turkey. As such, it prefers a hot, sheltered site. However, it is also robust and fully hardy, ideal for free-draining sunny borders. Cut back blooms after flowering and feed with a potash-rich fertiliser to encourage it it to flower again the following year.
