Painting with Plants: The speaker for September will be Chris Beardshaw.



Few designers are as synonymous with Chelsea Flower Show as Chris Beardshaw, who has been scooping up Gold Medals and Best in Show titles since 1998. He describes it as an 'addiction'; one he finds exciting, challenging and ultimately satisfying – if inexplicable. He is quoted as saying that he" always approaches the design in the same way, whether I am dealing with a private client or whether I'm dealing with a Chelsea garden. For me, it's very much about finding those threads of a storyline that you could

weave together into a garden tapestry that resonates with the person that you're designing it for. ..."

The roots of Chris Beardshaw's career go back to childhood, when at the age of four he was given his first packet of seeds and a watering can. Chris studied horticulture at England's Pershore College in Worcestershire and received an M.A. in Landscape Architecture from the University of Gloucestershire. At 28 he became Pershore's youngest full time lecturer and went on to teach and consult at various universities and colleges throughout the UK and received an Honorary Degree from the University of Liverpool in 2013. He's won 14 RHS Gold medals: He's been 6 times winner of the RHS Best in Show award: He's the author of 4 books and has designed 40 show gardens internationally. We are delighted that he's made the journey up to Oxenhope to talk to us!

Plant of the Month: Eucryphia Glutinosa



Eucryphia glutinosa, is the hardiest of the Eucryphias and is the only one that is deciduous. The species was introduced to British horticulture in1859 and is probably best known as one of the parents of Eucryphia x nymansensis. It has very fragrant flowers, which are loved by bees, and even with flowering past its peak, Eucryphia glutinosa remains interesting as the petals fall, leaving behind the 'paintbrush' heads of tightly packed anthers which will remain a few days more. It

requires a moist, acid soil, with its roots shaded from the sun. It has an RHS AGM award. Sizeable examples in cold gardens include a pair of trees at Howick Hall Northumberland at 10 metres; one at Keir House near Dunblane, Scotland 9 metres, and the one I know, at Crathes Castle, Aberdeenshire, 8 metres. Stockists: Burncoose Nurseries TR16. 6BJ The founder of Inverewe Gardens in Scotland said of this plant `I do not know of any shrub that I can more highly recommend to everyone. It is such a good doer and never sick or sorry whatever the seasons may be like. They are most floriferous and their blooms are so lovely, a little like sprays of a white dog rose',
