Here in my garden in central France, it's been a completely different gardening scenario. The summer has been very hot and dry and plants, shrubs and trees have all suffered.

So while you were all praying for some sun, I was longing for rain. As ever in a garden, there have been some winners and losers.

My quince tree (*Cydonia oblonga*, variety Vranja) has never before borne much fruit, but this year has 47 pale green fruit which are ripening to a golden yellow. They can't be eaten raw, but cooked on their own, or with apples, they are quite delicious. It's a perfect tree for a small garden as, after 10 years, it's only five feet high. In spring it is covered in the prettiest large, single pale pink flowers.

I'm looking forward to joining you all again on October 14 and hearing how Sue Beesley's transformation of Bluebell Cottage garden has progressed.
