Oxenhope survivors

This is the first in an occasional series of articles by Steve Spires outlining plants which do well in Oxenhope.

Steve has gardened in Oxenhope for the past nine years and during that time has seen many plants struggle and fail in the sometimes harsh conditions, whilst other plants seem well suited to the conditions.

The first plant I write about is *Spiraea*.

I hope this is of some interest to the (perhaps few) people who are not already familiar with them. Here are a couple of reliable shrubs. One flowers in summer, the other in spring and so their pruning requirements differ.

Spiraea japonica

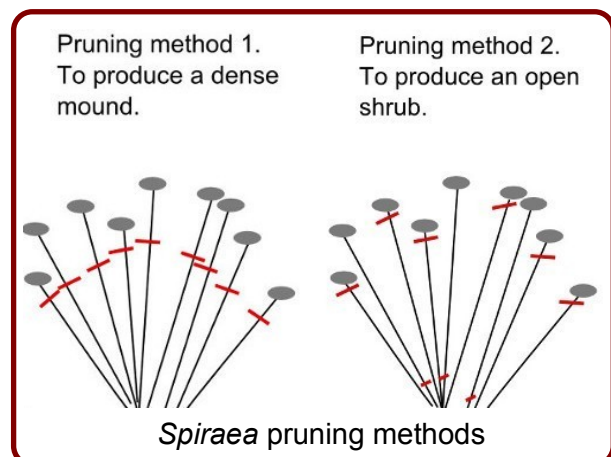
This deciduous shrub grows to 1 to 1.5 metres in height. There are several different varieties and most have mid-green leaves and flattish clusters of small purple flowers in mid to late summer.

It should be pruned in late winter or early spring before bud-burst. If just trimmed over to remove dead flower heads and a few inches of stem it will thicken up into a fairly dense mound covered in small flower heads.

A more open appearance, with fewer, larger flower heads at a range of different heights can be maintained if pruned more selectively, removing perhaps a quarter of the oldest stems down to ground level and also removing any remaining dead flower heads. The attractive yellow-leaved varieties (eg 'Goldflame') seem to be less vigorous than the green-leaved, but still survive in Oxenhope.

Spiraea 'Arguta' (was known as *Spiraea x arguta*) – Bridal Wreath

This deciduous shrub grows to 1.5 to 2 metres. Its leaves are greyish-green and it produces long arching stems covered in small white flowers in spring. It should be pruned after flowering in spring. Remove flowered shoots and perhaps also cut one or two of the oldest stems down to ground level. Specimens of this plant are growing in some very exposed spots in Oxenhope.
