February's speaker tells of plans for Harlow Carr

Paul Cook became the new curator of RHS Garden Harlow Carr in Harrogate in September 2013.

Before that he was curator at Ness Botanic Gardens for more than 11 years. At Harlow Carr, Paul is responsible for managing and developing the garden's plant collections and leading a team of 30 horticulturists, RHS trainees and volunteers.

Paul said: "I have long term plans for its gardens, and for education and helping people get into horticulture as a career.



"RHS Garden Harlow Carr is a wonderful garden, with a lot of potential, especially in the woodland. I'm focusing on shade planting to create even more

year-round interest for visitors. Although I'm thinking about the bigger picture, with long-term plans looking as far ahead as half a century, there will be many new things for visitors to see within the next few years."
