Creating an Alpine trough and more.

February's talk will be about how to create an alpine trough and the best alpine plants to grow in this area. The talk will be given by Michael and Allison Mitchell, the owners of gold medal winning Slack Top Nursery, one of the UK's top five specialist growers of alpine plants.

The nursery is located high up in Heptonstall in a lovely setting overlooking the moors. This inspiring talk will not only be about planting in troughs but also how to grow these plants in other garden situations such as in scree beds and on gravel.

Winter Flowering Aconite: Plant of the month



One of the varieties of winter aconite that John Grimshaw illustrated at last month's talk was *Eranthis hyemalis* 'Schwefelglanz', which has pale sulphur-yellow petals surrounded by bright green "ruffs" of bracts in winter. *Eranthis hyemalis* comes from the buttercup family, and has polished yellow flowers surrounded by a collar of green leaves. It is native to chalky woodlands in central Europe and it

gets its name from its willingness to flower before everything else (hyemalis is Latin for winter-flowering). It flowers from early January into February, exploiting the short

period of light before the tree canopy explodes into leaf, shading the woodland floor, before disappearing back into the soil. In order to thrive, it needs to spend the rest of the year in dappled shade and in moisture-retentive soil: It is best bought as an in-the-green plant.
