I could always take or leave the small alpines and questioned the larger *C. coriacea* and *C. semi-cordata* were difficult and not suitable in my garden. An evergreen shrub was taken out and the *celmisia* made a fine specimen in the back garden under *Circidiphyllum* "Red Fox". The pure sword like leaves of pur silver come from a central root system as do the flowers. These are white daisies of good size and texture with a clean yellow centre. Michael Mitchell from Slack Top was at the East Lancs Show with *C. semi-cordata* for sale. He has some special hybrids. Guess what – it is here with me as custodium. I am sure I could get to like these plants.

The Hardy Plant Society, West Yorkshire Group have a stand at RHS Chelsea in 2010. As a member I have been asked to open my garden on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> August this year.
